





# School playground equipment keeps kids safely out of reach of grizzly bears

Though grizzly bears frequent many rural Alaskan communities, school staff in Gustavus Alaska have rejected U.S. Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos' claim that guns are needed to protect children from bears. For years, the school has touted an innovative program that combines bear safety and awareness with building strength and agility among students. Children practice a weekly drill in which everyone climbs to the top rungs of the playground equipment, where they are safely out of reach of marauding wildlife. Says one school administrator, "Though it's not what the playground equipment was designed for, we have found that it is an effective solution that is highly popular among students."



When asked for her comment on the Gustavus School's gun-free approach to bears, Secretary DeVos declined to be interviewed, explaining that schools in Alaska were not under her jurisdiction because they are not in the United States. Geography teachers across the nation flooded DeVos' office with calls and emails, suggesting that she repeat the 5<sup>th</sup> grade at any traditional public school of her choice.
